Tonbridge Lodge was consecrated in May 1877.

It changed its name to Medway Lodge in 1882 and this identity lasted until September 2024 when its original name of Tonbridge Lodge was restored.

We meet in the Masonic Centre in St Johns Road, Tunbridge Wells five times a year and our members comprise of individuals from all walks of life and age range.

There are three Degrees in Craft Freemasonry: Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason. Every freemason will have experienced passing through these various stages.

Tonbridge Lodge is in the Province of West Kent, warranted by the United Grand Lodge of England. It has a reputation for excellent ritual which would make it an ideal first choice to start in Freemasonry. We are a friendly and welcoming lodge and for this reason we have many regular guests at our meetings.

We actively support every member in his journey through the Craft, particularly in the early stages. During this time, each member will receive mentoring and support from our experienced members, including assistance with the ritual and explanation of the roles of each Officer. Only when the individual is ready, would he be expected to progress within the lodge.

Apart from lodge meetings, we also meets socially with other lodges in the Masonic Centre and at other popular venues, for a breakfast, a carvery luncheon, a curry or a Christmas dinner. Friends and family and non-Freemasons are welcomed at our social events.
